What is Machi-Communication?

The Great Hanshin and Awaii Earthquake occurred on January 17, 1995, and about 80% area of Mikuradori 5-chome and 6-chome in Nagata ward. Kobe City was burnt down.

Machi-Communication (M-COMI) was established in April 1996. Two volunteers rushed to the devastated area from Kanto just after the earthquake. While developing support activities, they began to help with the office work of the Mikuradori 5-chome and 6-chome Community Creation Association in October 1995. They participated in the preparation of the joint memorial service for the victims in Misuga District in January 1996, helping with communications and coordination to hold the service. Through these activities, they noticed that the residents needed to return to their communities. Subsequently, they established M-COMI to provide continuous support for the communities. Most original members of this group, including the representative, have now been replaced, but the group has continued to provide intellectual and physical support for the communities.

M-COMI supports these associations by keeping records of the meetings, holding events, and promoting the implementation of projects.

Research and studies __

M-COMI conducts research and studies on vacant lots in the devastated areas and seeks to find means of utilizing them. The results are reported in a monthly newsletter "Machi-Comi (M-COMI)."

In partnership with Le Fauve, an NPO, events were held two times on a vacant lot in 2003 and 2004. The events were called the "Vacant Earth Exhibition," in which art works were exhibited on the vacant lots.

January 1996

The first memorial service for the earthquake victims in Misuga District was held (held annually up to the present) April 1996

Coordination of cooperative housing project began.

August 1996

Kawachi-ondo Summer Festival was held (continued up to the present).

August 1997

The Mikura School first workshop was held (held semiannually up to the present).

January 2000

The completion ceremony for Mikura 5, a cooperative housing project, was held.

March 2000

M-COMI and local residents visited an earthquake devastated area in Taiwan. (subsequently visited twice).

Acceptance of students on their school trip began in order to provide opportunities for the study of earthquake disasters. January 2003

A photo-exhibition entitled "Present and Past, Eight years after the Earthquake - Photo exhibition of the community"

The Minister's Prize of the 7th Disaster Prevention and Communication Creation Grand Prix (Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications) was awarded.

The Mikura Week Vacant Earth Exhibition was held to revitalize vacant lots.

September 2003 The Prime Minister's Prize for Disaster Prevention was awarded.

December 2003

Mikura karuta, a local karuta, was completed.

January 2004

The Mikuradori 5, 6, and 7-chome Residents' Association Hall was completed.

September 2004

The production of a magazine for the restoration of the Mikuradori 5, 6, and 7-chome area began.

Holding workshops and accepting trainees -

Workshops called the Mikura School have been held to study earthquake disasters and the recreation of communities. The first workshop was held in August 1997 and since then it has been held twice a year. In addition, training has been provided to university students and other people who want to study these issues.
